Like the previous year, this year also the IQAC held periodic meetings with the Academic Committee comprising of the Heads of the various departments of the college to chalk out strategies for quality enhancement in teaching learning and other areas. The IQAC also continued its effort to motivate the teachers to pursue research in their concerned areas. Making arrangements for taking remedial coaching classes for the slow and backward learners have been part of the contributions made by IQAC.**

When efforts were being made to execute the various plan of action decided upon by the IQAC there occurred a big disaster in the college. A devastating fire broke out in the college building on the fateful night of 20th November,2010 in which the entire college building including the central library were gutted.Several fire tenders even after trying for hours together failed to douse the fire that engulfed the entire college building within minutes. College assets worth several crores of rupees were burnt into ashes. Besides, many valuable records and documents were gutted in the fire. Almost half of the existing stock of books in the central library was burnt into ashes.</p> <p>In view of the mega disaster faced by the college, all the plan of action drawn by the IQAC in the beginning of this year stood shattered. The entire college fraternity had to be busy in recreating the infrastructures in order to keep the teaching learning process going without interruption. Whatever little fund was there at the disposal of the college authority, had to be utilised to restore normal academic activities in the college. It is worth mentioning that for some time, classes were taken in the open field, as theexisting class rooms were completely gutted in the fire and new ones were not yet ready.Fortunately enough, the UGC sanctioned grants to the tune of Rs.42 Lakh under UGC's XI plan schemes for infrastructure development and for certain other</p>

	<p>purposes. The lion's share of the said UGC grants had to be utilised in recreating the fire ravaged infrastructure of the college.</p> <p>2. 8 nos of class rooms were constructed/renovated to cater to the immediate need of taking classes and holding examinations.</p> <p>3.200 pairs of desks-benches were made for accommodating the students in the examination halls.</p> <p>4.15 nos of computers sets were purchased in order to provide ICT facilities to various departments of the college .</p> <p>5.One extension education programmewas undertaken at the aegis of the Extension Education Cell of the College.</p> <p>6.Remedial coaching classes were held for the benefit of the students who are found to be slow in their learning process.</p> <p>7. 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

- **To bring this institution closer to the community by means of various extension educational activities.**

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

This institution is yet to fully adopt a Management Information System (MIS). As of now, the financial ledgers and cash books etc. of the college are kept and maintained by using the tally software. However, efforts are on to computerise the entire administration system in the near future.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Being an affiliated institution this college has little scope for doing anything towards Curriculum Development. Curriculum is framed and developed by the Gauhati University to which this college is affiliated.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The college encourages the use of a combination of different methods of teaching. For instance, Group discussion method, question answer method, quiz, home assignments, class tests, seminars are regularly organised to supplement the text book information. Remedial classes are also taken for the benefit of the disadvantaged learners.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

This college follows the Gauhati University guidelines in examination and evaluation matters. Accordingly, one sessional examination is held in each semester. Appearance in this examination is compulsory for all the students. Marks secured in this examination are added to the marks secured in the end semester examination. A student who fails to appear in the sessional examination is not allowed to appear in the end semester examination. In each paper of the programme, 20% weightage is given in the internal evaluation and 80% weightage is given in the external evaluation.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The college authority makes efforts to create a research environment in the college. Accordingly, teachers are encouraged to pursue research in their area of interest. Teachers are granted study leave for pursuing research. They also keep contributing to different research journals.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Like the preceding years, this year also, a good number of books- both text book and reference books- have been procured for the central library. Similarly, proposal has been taken to expand the existing building of the library to accommodate more book shelves as well as to ensure more space for the reading room in the library building.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Accordingly several meetings with the Heads of various academic Departments of the college were held to sort out ways as to how to effectively apply these innovative methods.**
- 2. Similarly, the IQAC strived to introduce some audio visual aids to make the teaching-learning process more effective for the students.**

7.2 Provide the Action Taken Report (ATR) based on the plan of action decided upon at the beginning of the year

As already mentioned above the college suffered a major setback in this year. When efforts were being made to execute the various plan of action decided upon by the IQAC there occurred a big disaster in the college. A devastating fire broke out in the college building on the fateful night of 20th November, 2010 in which the entire college building including the central library were gutted. In view of the mega disaster faced by the college, all the plan of action drawn by the IQAC in the beginning of this year stood shattered. The entire college fraternity had to be busy in recreating the infrastructures in order to keep the teaching learning process going without interruption. Whatever little fund was there at the disposal of the college authority, had to be utilised to restore normal academic activities in the college.

BEST PRACTICE- I

Name of the Practice: Students' Aid Fund

1. Goals:

- i) To extend financial support to the students belonging to the economically weaker section .
- ii) To inculcate a sense of fellow- feelings among the students and to have an understanding about the underprivileged section of the society.

2. The Context:

Kharupetia College is the only institution of higher studies in the minority dominated areas of Darrang District of Assam. Most of the students of the college hail from families belonging to low income group. These students coming from the marginalized families cannot afford higher education and these students are vulnerable to college dropouts. In order to discharge its social commitment, the College authority has made provision to extend a helping hand to these poor students in pursuing higher studies. It is hoped that this practice will go a long way in fostering philanthropic feelings amongst the students besides serving as a motivational factor to make the students responsible citizens in future.

3. The Practice:

The Students 'Aid Fund of the college was created way back in the year 2002-2003. The fund is generated by collecting a compulsory subscription from each and every student of the college. Initially an amount of Rs.10/-(Rupees ten) only was collected from each student, but subsequently, this subscription has been raised to Rs.30 per student. The fund so generated is deposited in the concerned Bank Account. After collecting the amount a committee is formed which invites applications from the poor and needy students for disbursement of the aid. Normally, students belonging to the BPL families are given the opportunity to apply for financial assistance from this fund. The committee formed for this purpose scrutinises the applications and makes a selection list of the beneficiaries among whom the entire amount collected during the year is distributed. It is pertinent to mention here that this financial aid is a onetime aid only which is extended only once in a year. However, a student beneficiary of a particular year may apply again the next year for the ai

4. Evidence of Success

The practice mentioned above has proved to be very successful. Every year a large number of students belonging to the poor families apply for financial assistance under this scheme. The amount of assistance provided from this fund is utilised by the poor students for paying college dues or for purchasing books etc. The numbers of beneficiaries under this Best Practice for the last four years are as follows.

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5.Problems Encountered and Resources required:

Of course, there is a proposal to enhance the amount of subscription to be collected from the students so that a bigger amount can be provided to the needy students in future.

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BEST PRACTICE- II

Name of the Practice: Library Users' Education

- Goal of the Practice:**
- To orient the newly enrolled library user to the facilities and services provided by the library.
 - To raise awareness about the services.
 - To optimize usage of the library.
 - To provide guidance on accessing electronic databases (infontet) to faculty and scholars.

The Context: Over the years, it has been seen that the newly enrolled users of the library face various problems in availing of the library services of the college. Owing to their lack of awareness about the available services, many users are not able to optimize usage of the library. It is in this context that the IQAC of the college mooted the idea of initiating steps to provide users' education to the newly enrolled students of the college so that they can derive the optimum benefit from the library services.

The Practice: In the beginning of the academic session, an orientation programme is arranged by the librarian of the college who is assisted by his subordinate staff as well as the senior experienced teachers. In the said programme, the new students are explained about the library rules and the procedure of using the library services. They are also oriented about easy and convenient ways of tracing text and reference books from the stacks without the assistance of the library staff. Moreover, library staff meets the users who walk into the library and gather details of information needs and take them to the process of retrieving information from the library.

Evidence of success: The practice has resulted in considerable improvement in the quality of library users of the college. Following the orientation given in the beginning of the session, students in general and the new users in particular, find it easy to avail the library services. The practice also ensures optimal use of the various facilities available in the college library.

Problems encountered The practice is not free from problems. Arranging orientation programme involves
